



Environment Policy & Scope

Our Commitment

At Squamish Terminals, we are committed to a clean, healthy environment. We are committed to environmental excellence and continual improvement of our Environmental Management System (EMS). To achieve this, we will establish and maintain environmental objectives and targets in accordance to our environmental policy and meet the four principles outlined below.

Principles

1. **Compliance** – Squamish Terminals is committed to comply with relevant environmental legislation and regulations, and with other voluntary programs such as Green Marine.
2. **Prevention of Pollution** – Squamish Terminals is committed to the prevention of pollution. We will minimize harmful releases to the air, water or land and continue to find ways to reduce our impact on the environment.
3. **Energy & Natural Resources** – Squamish Terminals will strive to use energy and natural resources in an efficient manner, including reduce, re-use and recycle whenever possible.
4. **Communications** – Squamish Terminals will communicate its Environmental Policy to its employees, customers, partners and suppliers.

Squamish Terminals will continuously seek opportunities to improve our adherence to these principles, and will periodically report progress to our stakeholders. A sound Environmental Policy and Environmental Management System benefits our employees, customers, partners and suppliers by contributing to the overall well-being and economic health of the community we serve.

Environmental Management System – Scope

The scope of the Environmental Management System (EMS) includes all activities controlled by Squamish Terminals within site boundaries, including its water lots. Squamish Terminals' EMS provides a mechanism for environmental management throughout all service areas, including receiving, storage, delivery and stevedoring of commodities, as well as maintenance, information systems, accounting and management.

The EMS is designed to manage environmental aspects that Squamish Terminals can control or directly influence. Examples of environmental aspects that are not controlled or directly influenced by Squamish Terminals include, but are not limited to, the following:

- movement, berthing and emissions of vessels and barges
- movement of rail cars by CN Rail or trucks by various hauliers
